register for the 23rd LD forum and about 75 for the commissioner forum.

Tacoma-Pierce County League had already planned a 26th Legislative District forum so we partnered with them to publicize that event, which was also well attended.

Our Candidate is Democracy: Election Cybersecurity Training

What could discourage or prevent citizens from voting? How could ballot tabulation be manipulated? The 2020 reality is that hackers, disinformation campaigns, and other interference from Iran, China and Russia are not just plots from Hollywood suspense films. All 50 state election offices have been attacked by U.S. adversaries, and although the firewalls have held so far, the threats are ever present and becoming more sophisticated. With the pandemic compounding security concerns, keeping up with new ways to protect the integrity of our elections is urgent.

Led by Executive Director Adam Clayton Powell III, the non-partisan, independent University of Southern California Election Cybersecurity Initiative, whose motto is “Our Candidate is Democracy,” has been holding virtual workshops for each of the 50 states to train staffers, candidates, state parties, and state and local election workers in the latest techniques of how to prevent attacks on our electoral systems. Washington State’s Virtual Workshop via Zoom on June 23 was attended by Secretary of State Kim Wyman along with other state election and campaign officials. Four members of LWVWA also attended.

Dr. Clifford Neuman, associate professor of computer science at USC, was the main speaker. He warned that any person or thing connected to elections or campaigns is at risk, including candidates, politicians, campaign workers, election officials, journalists, news sites, social media, organizational systems, and voters. Personal devices are also vulnerable. Adversaries can even target family and friends of officials, anything to disrupt an election. They attempt to manipulate voters by micro-targeting ads, creating confusion, releasing unflattering and stolen data, and pushing disinformation such as announcements that the due date for register-

ing to vote has been changed or a polling place location has moved.

Neuman stated that America’s enemies work to discourage or prevent voting, manipulate vote tallies, and create distrust in the voting

outcomes. They gain access because of poor password management, malicious code (viruses), social engineering, unprotected data, and promoting misinformation. Strong passwords unique to different accounts are key to stopping these attacks. Two-step or multi-factor authentication is recommended.

Neuman’s suggestions to prevent “phishing” include being cautious about clicking on e-mail links that could install malware or ransomware on computers, always keeping a disconnected backup of data, and only downloading the most needed apps from trusted sources.

Looking Toward the November Ballot: Referendum 90

While this November's ballot will not contain any initiatives, it will include one referendum, Ref. 90. This referendum will ask voters to approve or reject ESSB 5395 (Comprehensive Sexual Health Education), which passed the legislature and was signed by Governor Jay Inslee in March 2020. The LWVWA recommends a vote to approve ESSB 5395 on the ballot.

The bill ensures that all students statewide receive age-appropriate information that is medically and scientifically accurate; parents have the right to opt their student out of the class. Only 18 or 19 of our 295 school districts don't provide comprehensive sexual health education. Where our students live shouldn't determine the information they receive. The opponents of ESSB 5395 are spreading much misinformation about this bill, such as "graphic sex education and teaching sex positions in elementary school" and "sexual health will be taught in all classes (math, social studies, computer, etc.)," and that the bill "denies parents

and school boards the power to decide what shall be taught."

None of these statements is true, something we can see from reading the bill. ESSB 5395 requires that comprehensive sexual health education be provided twice in grades 6-8 and 9-12, starting with the 2021-22 school year, and once in K-3 and 4-5, starting with the 2022-23 school year. The bill states that K-3 instruction must be in social-emotional learning. This could include stranger danger, good touch/bad touch, and using your words instead of your hands.

The LWVWA will be joining the Safe and Healthy Youth Washington campaign, so please go to its website and volunteer or donate. 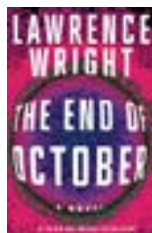
What We're Reading
