VISION STATEMENT: We envision a democracy where every person has the desire, the right, the knowledge and the confidence to participate

HOW THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS BEGAN Source: https://lwvwa.org/our-history

- 1854: Arthur Denny, founder of Seattle, proposed woman suffrage in the first legislative meeting in Olympia. Failed eight to nine vote.
- **1871**: The Washington Territory Woman Suffrage Association was formed in Olympia.
- **1883**: The territorial legislature **gave women the vote**.
- **1887**: Women **lost their vote** when the Territorial Supreme Court ruled that Congress did not intend to give territories the power to enfranchise women.
- **1889**: Women were unable to vote for delegates to the State Constitutional Convention.
- 1895: The first convention of Washington State's Equal Suffrage Association was held.
- **1897**: **Woman suffrage was submitted to the voters** as a separate amendment to ratification of the constitution. Failed.
- 1910: The amendment to the Washington State Constitution allowing women to vote carried by nearly two to one. The fifth state to give women the right to vote nine years before 19th Amendment extended the vote to all the nation's women.
- **The League of Women Voters of Washington was organized**. Seattle and Tacoma were the first two local Leagues in the state. The National League was founded in Chicago six months before the 19th Amendment to the US Constitution was ratified on August 18, 1920.

- The League of Women Voters is a nonpartisan political organization
- We encourage the informed and active participation of citizens in government
- The League acts in support of, or in opposition to, selected governmental issues that its members have studied
- It does not support or oppose candidates, factions, or political parties




STATE & NATIONAL LEAGUE POSITION STATEMENTS



Washington State: Program in Action 2021-2023 (PDF)

PROGRAM IN ACTION (PIA) is designed to help League Leaders make effective use of LWVWA policy positions. It is a brief summary of studies, consensus and action taken by the League of Women Voters of Washington since the 1920s. League positions are included in their entirety. PIA is updated every two years with additional background material and any new positions statements.




National League: Impact On Issues 2022-2024 (PDF)
